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## Hundreds of Leaders Gather in Accra for Inaugural Africa Summit on Women and Girls in Technology

- *African policymakers and technology leaders - including some of the continent's most prominent women - will meet to determine the policy steps needed to close Africa's growing digital gender gap, which is the largest in the world<sup>1</sup>*
- *High-level panels and lightning talks will focus on issues around affordable broadband, digital skills and entrepreneurship, and women's rights online*

**13 September 2016.** Over 200 of Africa's leading technology innovators are scheduled to gather September 13-14 in Accra, Ghana for the inaugural Africa Summit on Women and Girls in Technology. The new UN Sustainable Development Goals commit countries to achieve universal and gender-equitable Internet access, and to enhance the use of ICTs to empower women, yet research has shown that women in some communities are up to 50% less likely than men to be online<sup>2</sup>. In Africa, where nearly 80% of the population remains offline, this problem is particularly acute. As African and other leaders come under pressure to show progress on these ambitious commitments, Summit participants will explore how technology policies can work to close the digital gender divide and empower African women and girls through technology.

The two-day event will feature lightning talks from young African female technologists, as well as high-level discussions with many of Africa's most prominent ICT policymakers and technology leaders today, including: Dr Omobola Johnson, former Nigerian Minister of Communication Technology; Funke Opeke, CEO of MainOne; Angelique Weeks, Chairperson of the Liberia Telecommunications Authority; Anne Githuku Shongwe, Founder and CEO of Afroes Interactive Learning; and Nnenna Nwakanma of the World Wide Web Foundation. Sessions will highlight the need for gender-responsive ICT policy in Africa, and will aim to design the solutions needed to enable millions of African women and girls to benefit from greater access to technology, and to use their skills to build a better Africa for all.

The 2016 Summit — a collaboration between the Alliance for Affordable Internet (A4AI), the World Wide Web Foundation, the Ghana-India Kofi Annan Center of Excellence in ICT (AITI-KACE), the African Development Bank, and UN Women — will also feature the launch of a new framework from the Web Foundation to audit the digital gender gap, along with 10 country-specific assessments that analyse the policy efforts and progress made across these countries toward reducing barriers to women's online access and use.

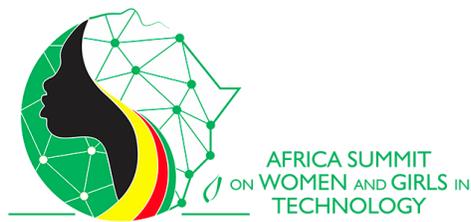
